Subject: Protect Orange County Waterways from Toxic Herbicide Applications

Dear Members of the Orange County Board of Supervisors,

I am writing to urge the Orange County Board of Supervisors to take immediate action to protect Orange County's creeks, rivers, wetlands, and coastal waters from the use of toxic herbicides in and around our waterways.

Orange County residents value clean water, healthy ecosystems, and safe recreational spaces. The routine application of chemical herbicides near streams, channels, flood-control facilities, and other water-adjacent environments poses significant risks to aquatic life, water quality, public health, and biodiversity. Scientific studies have demonstrated that herbicide runoff can adversely affect fish, amphibians, beneficial insects, native plants, and other organisms that depend on healthy aquatic ecosystems.

Many herbicides persist in the environment and can be transported downstream during rainfall or irrigation events, ultimately reaching our beaches and the Pacific Ocean. These chemicals may contribute to habitat degradation, disruption of food webs, and declines in sensitive species that are already facing increasing environmental pressures.

Orange County has an opportunity to demonstrate environmental leadership by adopting safer and more sustainable vegetation management practices. Integrated vegetation management strategies—including mechanical removal, targeted hand-weeding, mulching, restoration with native plants, and other non-chemical approaches—have been successfully implemented by agencies throughout California. These methods can effectively control invasive species while minimizing risks to water quality and wildlife.

I respectfully request that the Board:

1. Suspend the use of toxic herbicides in and adjacent to Orange County waterways whenever feasible.
2. Conduct a comprehensive review of current herbicide application practices and their potential impacts on water quality and aquatic ecosystems.

3. Increase transparency by providing public notice of planned herbicide applications and making monitoring data readily available.
4. Prioritize non-chemical and least-toxic alternatives for vegetation management.
5. Develop long-term strategies that protect both flood-control infrastructure and environmental health.

The health of our waterways directly affects our communities, wildlife, and coastal resources. Future generations deserve clean creeks, thriving habitats, and oceans free from unnecessary chemical contamination. I encourage the Board to act proactively and adopt policies that safeguard Orange County's precious water resources.
